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REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2022

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 March 2022. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and priorities

Founded in Northwest Wales in 2004 and now operating across the UK, The Outdoor Partnership (TOP) has been successfully 'Enhancing People's Lives through Outdoor Activity" for 18 years. This means the charity has been creating real employment opportunity for young people in the outdoors; empowering communities and removing inequality of access to outdoor activity for underrepresented and disadvantaged groups; enabling people to make positive Mental and Physical health decisions.

Teaching respect and care for our natural environment, TOP works to support the people of Wales and other UK areas to take up outdoor activities as a life-long pursuit. Its new strategy has defined its VISION for the next ten years of 'Enhancing people's lives through outdoor activity'. This VISION means enhancing people's physical and mental health and wellbeing, the economic return (including employment), the social value through outdoor activity, grassroots participation in outdoor activities.

Our objectives

- 1. Seek to deliver generational change to encourage lifelong participation in outdoor activity and support the recovery from the Covid-19 pandemic.
- 2. Building capacity to support local participation, performance, skills development (first time experiences through to long term sustainability and repeat activities) and employment of all ages.
- 3. Enhancing the partner delivery model to develop the current framework across the rest of Wales and throughout the UK.
- 4. Development of quality products to provide enjoyable outdoor experiences.

Our Priorities

- Equality, Diversity, and Inclusion by targeting underrepresented and disadvantaged groups and improving their lives through outdoor activity.
- Focus on disadvantaged young people
- Sustainable use of the environment and natural resources, enhanced partnership working
- Improving people's mental and physical wellbeing particularly in supporting the Covid-19 Pandemic
- Employability & education projects—difficulties in recruitment—as recovery from Covid-19—further learning and training/awareness raising/opportunities/outdoor learning, education, and training e.g., National Curriculum for Wales Guidance document in outdoor adventure learning to support primary and secondary schools across Wales, apprenticeships, and trainee schemes
- Shared learning & knowledge and good practice
- Tackling & breaking down barriers e.g., transport/social norms/EDI
- Volunteering building capacity and community clubs and groups across Wales VOLUNTEER

Public benefit

The trustees confirm that they have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing the charity's aims and objectives and in planning future activities.

Volunteers

The current value of volunteers supporting the charity based on commercial instructor rates is approximately £1.7 million per year.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Charitable activities - How our activities deliver public benefit.

The Outdoor Partnership (TOP) is a registered Charity, established in 2004 to improve opportunities for local people to achieve their potential through outdoor activities. Each year the charity provides thousands of opportunities for

people to engage with their natural resources through participation, social prescribing, volunteering, training and employability programmes, improving people's health, social and economic well-being.

This year has been another incredibly challenging year for our communities, our partner organisations and both the groups and individuals with whom we work. There has however been much to celebrate, and I hope this brief report manages to capture a flavour of the positive work that has taken place during the past 12 months. We are grateful to all our funders, sponsors, volunteers, and stakeholders for their continued support. This has enabled us to continue working throughout the pandemic although it has necessitated adapting the ways in which we work. Our thanks go to both employees and the partners of TOP who have given their time and expertise to help others during this difficult period.

We were able to re-activate our projects following the second lockdown of 2021. As a result, a total of 28,442 people took part in a variety of outdoor activities for health, social and economic wellbeing in all areas of operation (UK).

- 13,707 (6507 adults and 7200 under 18's) took part in taster sessions and development programmes
- A total of 198 community-based outdoor activity clubs were supported by our staff team, 8 of which are NEW and established by TOP.
- 11938 are members of these clubs (adult males 4063; Junior males 2648; adult females 3068; junior females 2159)
- 379 (293 existing and 86 new) volunteers attending National Governing Body Awards
- Total of 759 volunteer leaders, coaches, and assistant leaders in supported clubs
- 1524 disabled people took part in a variety of outdoor activity programmes and events
- 525 women took part in our This Girl's Adventure programme
- 264 young people took part in our Pathways to employment programme
- 105 people suffering mental ill health took part in our social prescribing projects

Volunteering and Community Development programme – Our volunteering project has expanded to all areas of Wales and UK regions through our new OADOs in the new regions, overseen and managed by our Volunteer Officer.

- We offered free membership to all community-based groups and clubs in Wales in 2021 as was agreed by the Board due to COVID
- A total of 198 community-based outdoor activity clubs across Wales were supported by our staff team
- 11938 are members of these clubs (adult males 4063; Junior males 2648; adult females 3068; junior females 2159)
- 8 new community-based clubs were established during 2021.
- 379 (293 existing and 86 new) volunteers attending National Governing Body Awards which were REC First Aid, FSRT, Surf Instructors Award, White Water Safety), Paddle sport Instructor Training, Paddle sport Leader Assessment, Paddle sport Leader Training, VHF, Mountain Leader Training, Paddle sport Touring Leader, WWSR, L2 MTB Coach, Safeguarding Children, ISA Level 1 Surf Coach, ISA Level 2 Surf Coach, White Water Leader Training, ITC Outdoor First Aid, RYA 1st Aid, Foundation Coach Training, WSA Adventure SUP Training, Pre Assessment Dinghy Instructor, Prep Day for Dinghy Instructor Pre Assessment, Safety Boat, PB 2, Walk Leader Training-Mentoring, RCDI, Safeguarding; Time to Listen, Wing-foil Instructor Level 1, MIAS Mountain Bike Leader Level 2, British Canoeing White Water Leader Training, Climbing Wall Instructor, Physical Training for climbing, Fundamentals of Climbing 3, British Cycling Ride Leadership Level 1, Rock Climbing Instructor training, British Canoeing Advanced Water Coach Training, Emergency First Aid, Sea Kayak Leader assessment, Ski Instructor Level 2, Alpine Skiing Foundation Instructor training course (Level 1), Winter ML, Sea Kayak Leader Training, ML Assessment, Advanced WWSR, Advanced REC, White Water Leader Assessment, Session Coach British Rowing, CWI Assessment, British Cycling Level 1 Coaching.

Employability programme – Our employability programme was able to reactive early on as activities were outdoors. Following our strict Covid-19 risk assessment, young people were able to attend weekly outdoor activity sessions including visits to local employers, trips outside of Wales (Scotland and Lake District) to help build their Mountain Leader Logbooks as well as attending pre-requisite and NGB courses. Again, this successful project which started in North Wales has been shared with our new officers in Mid and South Wales.

- During lockdown, online content and resources were provided through social media (Facebook and Instagram) to engage with participants.
- Dialogue maintained with all key partners (e.g. CMHTs, Community Wellbeing Teams, Housing Associations, JCP, Hafal, Gisda and other social prescribers) throughout.
- 264 young people took part in the Pathways to Employment programme
- 25 moved on to further learning and training during 2021
- 15 gained NGB Awards
- 13 moved on to volunteering in their local community
- 14 gained sustained employment as a result of their attendance on the programme

A series of wellbeing training, online safeguarding, and face to face first aid awareness courses were delivered as part of the project. In addition, a series of bike maintenance sessions were hosted to support people's confidence in how to look after a bike were delivered.

Inclusive Adventure Programme – Our project which engages with people with pan disabilities was able to reactivate in the spring engaging with 1524 people with disabilities. One group that we helped establish in 2019 has now become a registered charity providing sailing and water sports opportunities for disabled people and their families throughout the spring/summer and land-based activities throughout autumn/winter. TOP continue to offer advise where needed i.e., guidance on bilingualism and funding opportunities.

We were able to develop new Mental Health Social Prescribing projects with new partners and social prescribers, in new areas across Wales and work with new target groups. We were able to develop and implement the successful pilot from North Wales in our four new regions across Wales. 105 people benefited from our social prescribing projects in 2021.

'This Girls Adventure' programme saw some new exiting projects start in 2021 with a total of 525 women and girls benefited from this project in 2021. Example of one of the projects 'The New Horizons' is a Sailing/ Adventure Sport Initiative — A partnership between Ocean Youth Trust (Scotland) and The Outdoor Partnership and RYA Cymru to address the inequalities in participation in the outdoor sector and specifically to begin to address a national shortage of female skippers in the boating world.

The project has taken a selected group of 12 young women aged between 18 and 25 from the North Wales area on a chartered sailing boat (March 2022) and sail between the four current TOP areas, Cumbria, Ayrshire, Northern Ireland and North Wales.

At each area they spent a day participating in a range of outdoor activities supported by the new OADO's in each region. During 2021, the women worked towards achieving the Assistant Dinghy Instructor and for some the Dinghy Instructor qualification during the 18-month project, by attending various courses such as the RYA First Aid Course, The RYA VHF Course, Power Boat Level 2, and a Seamanship and Navigation course, as well as consolidating their sailing skills whilst sailing between the locations.

Another project involved restarting a female skiing programme with Llandudno Ski Centre to encourage more women and girls to take part in Snowsports. Four-week beginners' development block leading into intermediate and advance sessions and monthly social group look place.

The Outdoor Partnership is well placed to help divert people from the NHS improving peoples' mental health, increasing physical activity levels and reducing diseases such as obesity and diabetes. TOP can create community cohesion by supporting existing and creating new community-based outdoor clubs and hubs and capitalise on the fantastic volunteer workforce that has evolved from this pandemic and ensure opportunities are inclusive to all.

Next year we will continue to look for opportunities to influence nationally and share our experience with other regions across Wales and the UK, without losing focus and the impact we have in the North of Wales. This pandemic has taught us all just how important it is that our communities access the outdoors, the importance of nature and the natural environment and that that we all could do with a little help with using it sensibly, safely and in a sustainable way.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Financial position

During the year the Unrestricted funds have risen by £59,890 to £541,518 and the Restricted funds have increased by £60,979 to £471.142.

Principal funding sources

The principal funding sources were TNLCF (UK portfolio) TNLCF Wales, Sport Wales, WCVA Active Inclusion, Gwynt y Mor, NDA and Welsh Government Healthy and Active and Enabling Natural Resources and Wellbeing (ENRaW) grants.

Reserves policy

The charity aims to keep reserves equivalent to around six months (minimum) running costs, to be able to maintain the operations of the charity, in the event of any funding shortfall.

FUTURE PLANS

The Chief Executive Officer routinely reviews funding income and associated expenditure for future periods of up to two to three years and disseminates this information to the trustees in board meetings.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

The charity is controlled by its governing document, a deed of trust, and constitutes a limited company, limited by guarantee, as defined by the Companies Act 2006.

Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

Invitations for nominations for the position of trustees will be sent to all members with the notice of the AGM. Completed nominations will be accepted up to seven days before the date of the meeting. All nominations require the signature of the nominated person and the signature of a proposer and seconder, all of which shall be members of the charity.

Trustees are elected in the AGM and can serve for up to three years. Trustees representing the charity come with a breadth of understanding gained from their own experiences of the outdoors, their roles as volunteers within their respective organisations and equally important, the knowledge and skills gained from their chosen field of employment.

Organisational structure

The Stakeholder Groups meet at least twice a year, excluding the AGM. These meetings include the stakeholders and board members. The board of trustees meet at least four times a year and more if necessary.

The minutes from the previous meeting, an agenda, CEO report (quarterly updates and performance outcomes) are circulated prior to the scheduled meetings. Future aims and ambitions are considered in conjunction with the ongoing programme. Any discussion papers circulated prior to the meeting will be discussed and considered.

There are currently seven trustees on the board based on competencies and skills. The company secretary who is also the chief executive officer (CEO) sits on the board but has no voting rights.

Induction and training of new trustees

New trustees will go through an induction process as part of the charity's induction and training policy and this includes an overview of the charity, policies and procedures, staff structure, dates of board meetings and the charity's strategy. New trustees must complete the trustee declaration.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Related parties

Due to the nature of the charity's operations and the composition of the board of trustees it is inevitable that transactions will take place with organisations in which a member may have an interest. All transactions involving organisations in which a trustee may have an interest are conducted at arm's length. The Charity has a policy that all trustees must declare an interest if a related party transaction occurs.

Risk management

The trustees have a duty to identify and review the risks to which the charity is exposed and to ensure appropriate controls are in place to provide reasonable assurance against fraud and error.

The trustees have assessed the risks to which the charity is exposed, both in terms of financial and operational risks in carrying out its objectives and are satisfied that the systems are in place to mitigate exposure to major risk. Workplace risk assessments have been carried out for all operational processes and are regularly updated and checked by the CEO.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2022

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Allocation and apportionment of costs

Certain expenditure is directly attributable to specific activities and has been included in those cost categories. Certain other costs, which are attributable to more than one activity, are apportioned across cost categories on the basis of an estimate of the proportion of time spent by staff on those activities or estimated usage.

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

Hire purchase and leasing commitments

Rentals paid under operating leases are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities on a straight line basis over the period of the lease.

Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charitable company operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charitable company's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.
